The Constitution: What is its purpose?



Introduction:

The Constitution is a legal document setting out the **basic laws** for the government of Australia.

It is structured so that the Australian **people** hold the ultimate power.



The fundamental purpose of the Constitution:

is to define how **power** is shared within Australia.

It outlines where the **power** lies, who can use it and how it can be used



Purpose 1:

Federation and the creation of the Commonwealth of Australia

The Constitution established the Commonwealth of Australia, bringing the independent colonies together through Federation.


There is clearly divided powers between the Commonwealth and the States known as the Division of Powers.





Purpose 2:

Sharing power between the Legislature, Executive and Judiciary



The Constitution is also structured to split and share the power between the three branches of the government – the Judiciary, the Legislature and the Executive.

This is known as the Separation of Powers.



Purpose 3:

Protects the Australian People

By putting limits on power, the Constitution protects the Australian people from arbitrary power and uncontrolled authority.

Checks and balances ensures each body works within their area of responsibility.
